A message from Chief Rasmussen:

I am pleased to present the City of Lake Geneva Police Department's 2015 Annual Report. The men and women of the City of Lake Geneva Police Department have worked diligently and progressively to provide professional law enforcement services to our citizens and the many visitors who came to our City in 2015. We continue to provide outstanding service through the use of technology and 2015 saw the implementation of the Citizen Services module through ProPhoenix. This service allows citizens to report crime and request services through a website linked directly to the Mobile Data Computers utilized by our officers. This service improved communication with our citizens and increased the efficiency of our officers while answering complaints received through the website, allowing the citizen to observe the actions taken by the officers through online reporting.

In 2015, Law Enforcement statewide experienced challenges in recruitment and we were no different. We went into the height of tourism season four officers short in our reserve staff. We were able to work through the shortage but are looking to improve this issue in 2016, supplementing the reserve staff with part-time police officers to ensure appropriate coverage without compromising officer safety.

The past year also brought improved training as three of our officers successfully completed emergency medical technician certification. This training paid immediate dividends as these officers put their training to use with examples such as administering Narcan to save a life and delivering a baby prior to the arrival of emergency medical services.

We have continued to build relationships with the community, such as hosting blood drives, which has accounted for the possibility of 141 lives saved from local donors. In an effort to build relationships with the licensed establishments in the City, we hosted training for business owners and employees to improve operations at businesses that serve or sell alcohol. Our participation with the public/private partnership continued to gain steam as we hosted an active shooter training to a full house. The training was so well received that we have received requests to host additional training and will do so in early 2016. This specific training is extremely important as there has been an increase in incidents of domestic and foreign terrorism throughout our nation, many of which have occurred at private businesses or on our public streets.

We have observed strong support from the community, who have rallied around us despite negative media attention regarding isolated incidents of police use of force throughout the nation. Some of these use of force incidents involved emotionally disturbed persons and to ensure we are reducing the potential for crisis and injury to citizens and officers we will be sending officers to crisis intervention team training throughout the upcoming year.

In closing, I would like to thank all the men and women of the City of Lake Geneva Police Department. Their dedication and commitment to public service and protection make the City of Lake Geneva a wonderful place to raise a family and visit for vacation. I would also like to thank the Police and Fire Commission, Mayor Connors and members of the City Council for their support and commitment to providing the citizens of Lake Geneva a safe and secure environment. We continue to grow by implementing new technologies, improving our efficiency, while remaining under budget and meeting the needs of the community. Finally, I want to thank the citizens who supported our efforts and worked with us hand-in-hand to accomplish our Department mission.

Highlights of the Year

- ◆ Drug take back box installed September 26. We can accept unused prescription drugs, over the counter medications, liquids, inhalers, sprays

and vitamins. The drug box is accessible to the public 24 hours a day in the lobby of the Police Department/ City Hall and gives citizens the opportunity to anonymously dispose of unused prescription drugs.

- ◆ Automatic License Plate Recognition System (ALPRS) sees its first full year of use. Multiple stolen vehicles have been recovered. The system has also assisted officers with traffic enforcement, criminal investigations, and improved officer safety by alerting officers of vehicles that may be occupied by armed and dangerous individuals.
- ◆ Under Officer Nelson's leadership, we have continued hosting blood drives throughout the year. As a result of the blood drive efforts as many as 141 lives have possibly been saved.

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Morphotrak Fingerprinting System

Installed in January, the Morphotrak fingerprint system allows our department to identify and process subjects quickly. The quick print option returns known identities in 10 to 15 seconds.


In 2015, 89 individuals were fingerprinted, including a man wanted in Texas who had presented false identifying information.

Narcan Implementation Saves Lives

In January, Naloxone, commonly known as Narcan, was placed in each patrol car and all officers were trained in its use. As heroin use has grown throughout the nation and our City, the use of Narcan has given our officers a tool to fight overdoses from heroin and other opiate-based drug use. Narcan is administered by officers using a nasal injector. It is not dangerous if accidentally administered to someone not suffering from an opiate overdose.

Officers have successfully administered Narcan three times since we started to carry this tool in our patrol vehicles.

Public/Private Partnership Experiences Continued Success

In December, our Department hosted an active shooter training that was attended by public and private employees from the City as well as surrounding areas. Sergeant Daniel Derrick along with Captain John Peters from Emergency Management presented during the training. Topics included what to do in the event of an active shooter at their place of employment, medical treatment of injured individuals, and security measures that could be implemented to improve the safety of their business while reducing liability.

The training was attended by more than 60 people and was very well received. Our Department received numerous requests to hold a second active shooter training which we will do in 2016 in cooperation with the public/private partnership.


Officer Lucas Hansen has helped teach Hunter Education to more than ninety citizens throughout our City and surrounding areas in the past year. The classes are held in the Department's training room. Each session meets four times for a couple of hours. The course objectives are to reduce the potential for accidents and fatalities; to reduce the potential for conflict between participants, land owners and other resource users; and to promote safe, responsible and ethical use of the environment and our resources.

Organizational Chart 2016




UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING


The City of Lake Geneva reports crime statistics to the state Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR), which forwards the data to the FBI's national UCR Program. This reporting system is summary based and we submit summarized reports for eight Part I Offenses. The Part I Offenses include criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft), motor vehicle theft and arson. UCR also collects adult and juvenile arrest data for Part II Crimes, which encompass all other reportable offenses. The FBI compiles the UCR data and publishes various different crime statistics available to anyone interested in the Nation's crime statistics. *It should be noted that clearances (cleared) are subject to change as the case may not be resolved either through investigation or the judicial process upon the publication of this report.*


2015 Adult UCR Arrests by Month




2015 Juvenile UCR Arrests by Month

2015 ARREST HIGHLIGHTS

March

- ◆ A School Resource Officer began an investigation into a reported inappropriate relationship between a student and a school staff member. Detectives assisted in the investigation, resulting in the arrest of a 51 year old teacher from Badger High School. The teacher has been charged with two counts of sexual assault of a student by school staff and is awaiting trial.

August

- ◆ Officers responded to a report of a burglary in progress for a business inside the Landmark Center at 3:30 p.m. The suspect was observed leaving the business. Detectives were

able to obtain surveillance footage of the suspect. Detectives shared the photograph of the suspect on the Department Facebook page. The photograph was viewed by more than 46,000 people and a citizen provided the identity of the suspect. The suspect was subsequently arrested and charged with burglary of a building or dwelling, criminal damage to property, and misdemeanor theft.

September

- ◆ Officers received information of a suspect wanted in connection with the murder of his father in McHenry County, Illinois. Officers were able to locate the suspect and

his vehicle at a local motel in the City of Lake Geneva. Officers also received information that the suspect was in possession of a handgun and had a history of attempting suicide and could be confrontational with Law Enforcement. Officers forced entry into the suspect's motel room where he was taken into custody before a confrontation could occur. The suspect was extradited back to Illinois where he is confined and awaiting trial for the homicide of his father.

September

- ◆ A local bank reported a male suspect had entered the bank with multiple credit cards, requesting cash advances on each card. The suspect was provided with \$20,000 in cash. The bank determined the suspect had used credit cards that were fraudulently produced and took cash advances on credit cards throughout Southeastern Wisconsin, totaling over \$30,000. The suspect was taken into custody by the City of Lake Geneva Police Department. The suspect has been charged with two counts of false representation and two counts of fraud against a financial institution and is awaiting trial.

October

- ◆ Detectives obtained information and worked with the US Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) to serve a search warrant within the City. The search warrant was served and Detectives located a clandestine lab for the manufacture and distribution of human growth hormone. The suspect was taken into custody and is awaiting federal charges.

October

- ◆ A Detective received a report regarding a sexual assault of a child. It was determined the suspect in this case was contacting the child through a social

networking site. The Detective posed as the juvenile victim in an attempt to lure the suspect, who was from Illinois, back into the City for a meeting. The suspect arrived in the City, believing he would again be meeting with the child victim, but instead was taken into custody by numerous officers. The suspect was booked into the Walworth County Jail and has been charged with two counts of first degree sexual assault-sexual intercourse with a child under age 13 and possession of tetrahydrocannabinols (THC).

An increase in the number of accident reports requested in 2015 as compared to 2014 can be explained by our change in procedure. Based on the agency's interpretation of the Driver's Privacy Protection Act (DPPA), accident reports must now be requested by filling out an Open Records Request.



The Communications Center of the Police Department handles all 911 and non-emergency calls for the Police, Fire and EMS Departments in the City of Lake Geneva. This team of highly skilled, dedicated, and professional individuals provides optimal staffing coverage in the Center 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

Through the use of an Enhanced 911 system, dispatchers are able to determine the location of a 911 call even if the caller is unable to speak. Police, Fire or EMS resources can immediately be dispatched to the emergency. Utilizing the Phoenix Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) software package that integrates the department's record keeping and CAD systems, dispatchers are able to input, assign and update calls on a real-time basis and by using Global Positioning System (GPS) technology they can track the location of all resources. All dispatchers are trained and certified in the use of the state's Transaction Information for the Management of Enforcement (TIME) computer system for warrant, criminal history and driver license record checks.


In 2016, Communications Center staff will be receiving training in Emergency Medical Dispatching (EMD) to better serve citizens calling about medical related matters.



Total page views throughout 2015



Officer Albert C. Exner was shot and killed in the line of duty for the City of Lake Geneva Police Department June 19, 1931. Officer Exner left behind his wife, Anna, two sons, Albert, age 5 and Donald, age 3.

Upon approval of the Police and Fire Commission, the 2015 Employee of the Year Award was renamed in his honor as the Albert C. Exner Employee of the Year.

Communications Supervisor Jean Froggatt was the first recipient of the Albert C. Exner Employee of the Year, which was awarded to her on May 14, 2015 during National Police Week.
