2018 Annual Report

A message from Chief Rasmussen:

I am pleased to present the City of Lake Geneva Police Department's 2018 Annual Report. The men and women of the City of Lake Geneva Police Department have worked diligently and progressively to provide professional law enforcement services to our citizens and the many visitors who came to our city in 2018. We continue to provide outstanding service through the use of technology, training and education.

The City continues to grow and multiple organizations have worked tirelessly to attract additional tourists and host additional events throughout the year. This work, along with growth in the City, contributed to an increase in calls for service. The City of Lake Geneva Police Department handled 20,515 calls for service in 2018, a record number. There were 1,556 more calls for service in 2018 compared to 2017.

As calls for service increase, the demand on our personnel increases also. It has been extremely challenging to recruit additional part time officers due to the increased number of full time officer positions vacant throughout our recruiting demographic and Nation. As the part time officer position diminishes and will for the foreseeable future, our strategy to provide high quality police service will change to meet the needs of the City.

We have had continued success with the use of technology. Our automated license plate recognition system played an integral role in locating a missing infant who was a victim of a parental abduction from another jurisdiction. Our unmanned aerial vehicle (drone) located a suspect who fled from officers and fell unconscious in a wooded area, exposed to the elements. The use of the drone gave us the ability to limit the search to minutes as opposed to hours, cutting down on personnel costs and ultimately saving the suspect's life.

In an effort to reduce the intensity of a persons' physical, mental or emotional reaction to a crisis, we have continued to train our officers and telecommunicators in Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training. We trained three more department members in this technique in 2018. One of these officers received training in advanced crisis intervention techniques. Our Department now has 10 members trained in these techniques and we will continue to train department members in this discipline as trainings become available.

Our challenge remains to address an ongoing and nationwide opioid crisis. In 2018, our detectives took in 230 pounds of unused medication through our drug take back program. These efforts have kept the unused medications out of the hands of those who wish to consume or sell them illegally. In addition, these medications do not end up being dumped into our City water supply and lake.

In 2018, we lost one experienced officer to retirement. Officer Jeffrey Nethery retired from our Department after 26 years of dedicated full time service. Officer Nethery served as a reserve officer, patrolman and a detective during his tenure. In addition to those duties, Officer Nethery served as a field training officer and firearms instructor. To fill the open position, we promoted Officer Michael McBride to full time. Officer McBride, a true home grown cop, is a lifelong Lake Geneva resident, a Badger High School graduate and completed his degree in Criminal Justice at Gateway Technical College. Mike began his law enforcement career at our Department as a booking officer in 2013 and then transitioned to a reserve officer in 2015, before his promotion to full time officer in April 2018. Officer McBride is the son of Mike “Mac” and Dawn McBride. Mac served the City of Lake Geneva Fire Department for several years.

In closing, I would like to thank the men and women of the City of Lake Geneva Police Department. Their dedication and commitment to public service and protection make the City of Lake Geneva a wonderful place to raise a family and visit. I would also like to thank the Police and Fire Commission, Mayor Hartz and members of the City Council for their support and commitment to providing the citizens of Lake Geneva a safe and secure environment to live in. We continue to grow by implementing new technologies, improving our efficiency, and meeting the needs of the community. Finally, I want to thank the citizens who supported our efforts and worked with us hand in hand to accomplish our Department mission.





ENFORCEMENT APPRECIATION NIGHT



AUTOMATED LICENSE PLATE RECOGNITION SYSTEM (ALPRS) FINDS MISSING GIRL

Officers received information that a three month old girl was missing from Mount Pleasant and the 49 year old male suspect may be in the City of Lake Geneva. Mount Pleasant PD searched a shared database that stores Automated License Plate Recognition System (ALPRS) information and discovered two separate City of Lake Geneva PD patrol cars passed the vehicle owned by or in possession of the male. Photos of the male and the vehicle were shared with patrol officers. The vehicle was observed parked at the Lake Geneva Public Library. Officers searched the downtown business district and minutes later, observed the male and child on the Riviera Beach. The male was confronted and taken into custody without incident. Officers transported the child to the Police Department, where she was reunited with her mother.



UNMANNED AERIAL VEHICLE (DRONE) SAVES SUSPECT'S LIFE

Officers were requested to assist Town of Geneva Police Dept with a large fight at the Sugar Shack. During the altercation, a 26 year old male fled the scene in a pickup truck. Officers gave pursuit, however, lost the male's location. The male subject was located in the Town of Linn, where deputies from the Walworth County Sheriff's Dept pursued him into the City of Lake Geneva. A City of Lake Geneva officer successfully deployed stop sticks and the male subject abandoned his disabled vehicle. Officers tracked the male from the location observing footprints in the snow and scent tracking by K-9 officers of the Walworth County Sheriff's Office. A City of Lake Geneva Detective and Sergeant deployed an unmanned aerial vehicle (drone) and within minutes located the male subject's heat signature with the use of forward looking infrared (FLIR). The male subject was unconscious in a wooded area. Officers approached the male subject who was taken into custody without incident. The male subject was charged for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated and fleeing/eluding an officer.

OFFICERS RESPOND TO DROWNING

Officers were dispatched to the beach area of Big Foot Beach State Park for a reported drowning. Witnesses observed a male approximately 110 feet off of shore struggling to stay above water. Witnesses attempted to reach the victim, who went under water before they could reach him. Multiple agencies responded and searched for the victim, who was located. Lifesaving efforts were started on the victim but were unsuccessful.



UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

The City of Lake Geneva reports crime statistics to the state Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR), which forwards the data to FBI's national UCR Program. This reporting system is summary based and we submit summarized reports for eight Part I offenses. The Part I Offenses include criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft and arson. UCR also collects adult and juvenile arrest data for Part II crimes, which encompass all other reportable offenses. The FBI compiles the UCR data and publishes various different crime statistics available to anyone interested in the Nation's crime statistics. *It should be noted that clearances (cleared) are subject to change as the case may not be resolved either through investigation or the judicial process upon the publication of this report.*

2018 ARREST HIGHLIGHTS

January—

- Officers responded to the 700 block of North Street for a reported landlord/tenant dispute involving a shot fired. Through investigation it was discovered that the landlord checked on his tenant as he thought he smelled something burning. The two had a physical confrontation resulting in the landlord being thrown down a flight of stairs. The landlord fled to his apartment, while being pursued by the tenant. The landlord obtained a handgun and fired one shot towards tenant, who was not struck. Officers took the tenant into custody without incident and booked in the Walworth County Jail on charges of battery, criminal

trespass to dwelling, disorderly conduct and obstructing an officer.

February—

- Officers were dispatched to the 400 block of Garrison Drive for a reported drug overdose. Upon arrival, the suspect, a 25 year old male, became physically resistive towards officers. Officers deployed a taser on the suspect, who was taken into custody and booked into the Walworth County Jail. Charges of possession of heroin, felony bail jumping, possession of drug paraphernalia, resisting/obstructing an officer and disorderly conduct were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office on the suspect.

- Officers received a complaint of a dog living in a snow covered vehicle in the 100 block of West Main Street. Upon contact, officers found there to be a large amount of feces in the vehicle. The dog was removed and taken into custody. The dog's owner, a 44 year old male, was booked and released on charges of cruelty to animals, failure to provide sufficient water for animal, improper shelter-ventilation and misdemeanor bail jumping. The dog was taken to the Lakeland Animal Shelter.

March —

- An officer conducted a traffic stop on South Lakeshore Drive at Maytag Road.

The driver, a 50 year old female, Pingree Grove, Illinois, was issued citations for operating while under the influence-2nd offense, exceeding zones and posted limits for traveling 60 mph in a 25 mph zone and operating left of center. She was later released to a responsible party.

- Officers responded to the 700 block of West Main Street for a complaint of a person who had brandished a firearm in the 200 block of Broad Street. Officers made contact with the suspect, a 21 year old male, Kansasville, and took him into custody. Charges were referred up to the Walworth County DA's Office for endangering safety by use of a dangerous weapon-firearm, carrying a concealed weapon, carrying a

handgun where alcohol is sold, felony bail jumping and disorderly conduct while armed. He was subsequently confined in the Walworth County Jail on the above listed charges.

April—

- An officer conducted a traffic stop on Center Street at Wrigley Drive. It was determined the driver was falsely representing his identity to avoid the charges and a warrant from another police department. The suspect was positively identified by one of his tattoos. The driver, a 25 year old male, was issued citations for operating while under the influence-2nd offense, operating while revoked, failure to install IID, obstructing an officer and possession

of a controlled substance-THC. Subsequently he was confined in the Walworth County Jail on those charges.

- Officers investigated a report of disorderly conduct in the 500 block of Broad Street for a report of a male shoving a female out of a vehicle. Upon investigation, it was also discovered there was an altercation earlier in the night that occurred within the City. Charges were referred to the Walworth County DA's Office on a 26 year old male, Lake Geneva, for disorderly conduct, battery and bail jumping. The male was on conditions of bond not to contact the victim, but after being released from the jail the next day contacted and threatened the

female victim. The male showed up at the Walworth County Courthouse for his hearing where an officer was waiting to take him into custody. The male attempted to flee the scene but was detained by officers. Charges were also referred to the Walworth County DA's Office on the male for bail jumping and resisting an officer. He was confined in the Walworth County Jail.

May—

- The School Resource Officer at Badger High School was contacted by Badger staff regarding a juvenile who was believed to be selling psilocybin (commonly referred to as "shrooms") to Badger students. The School Resource Officer investigated and subsequently confiscated a bag of psilocybin mushrooms. Two juveniles were taken into custody

was confronted and taken into custody without incident. Officers transported the child to the Police Department where she was reunited with her mother.

- Officers responded to 1000 block of Wells Street for a report of two gun shots. Officers made contact with two persons occupying a vehicle matching the vehicle that fled from the scene. As one of the occupants, a 23 year old male, was speaking with officers, the officers observed he appeared intoxicated and had a handgun in his pocket. An officer quickly engaged the male subject and was able to trap and remove the handgun. The male subject was placed under arrest. Officers were able to recover the evidence at the scene indicating the firearm was fired into the floorboard of the vehicle.

- Officers were dispatched to Wal-Mart for a report of a male acting suspiciously. Upon contact with the suspect, officers smelled an odor of marijuana emitting from his person. After questioning, the suspect, an 18 year old Elkhorn man, admitted that his backpack contained a large amount of marijuana, 51 Xanax pills and 300 tabs of LSD. The suspect was booked into the Walworth County Jail and charges have been referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office for possession of those narcotics

The male subject was booked into the Walworth County Jail and charged with possession of a firearm while intoxicated, 2nd degree recklessly endangering safety, obstructing an officer and disorderly conduct.

- Officers responded to 100 block of West Street for a report of a male being held hostage with a knife to his throat. As officers were setting up a perimeter, the suspect, a 23 year old male, exited the residence with a knife in his hand. When officers announced, the male subject dropped the knife, fled on foot, jumped a fence and fell down an embankment. The male subject was placed under arrest and booked into the Walworth County Jail. He was charged with armed robbery with use of force, false imprisonment, burglary and resisting an officer.

June—

July—

- Officers were dispatched to the 200 block of Center Street for a report of a crash. It was also reported the driver of the offending vehicle attempted to flee but was being restrained by witnesses. Upon arrival, officers observed that the suspect, a 22 year old Lake Geneva man was physically subdued by an off duty police officer from Antioch, IL. The suspect, who was resistive to officers, was placed under arrest and booked into the Walworth County Jail. Charges for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, bail jumping, disorderly conduct and resisting an officer were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's office.
- Officers were dispatched to Main Street at Peller Road for a crash involving three vehicles and multiple

Injuries, including an infant. Upon arrival, officers observed three vehicles that sustained severe damage. In addition, there were multiple victims that suffered serious injuries. Witnesses reported that the operator of one of the vehicles was operating westbound in the eastbound lane of traffic and struck another vehicle head on, causing a chain reaction crash to a third vehicle. The operator of the offending vehicle, a 31 year old woman, Richmond, IL, was placed under arrest and booked into the Walworth County Jail. Charges for injury by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle (4 counts) and causing injury while operating under the influence were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office.

- Officers were dispatched to 830

similar crimes at health clubs in their respective jurisdictions. The suspect, a 49 year old Milwaukee man, was identified through the combined effort of these departments and has since been confined. The case is still under investigation but due to the thoroughness of the officer's investigation, numerous cases will be closed in Wisconsin and Illinois.

September—

- Officers were dispatched to 600 block Bloomfield Road, Lake Geneva Middle School for a report of a "shooting threat made by a student". A school resource officer reviewed a video posted on snapchat by a 12 year old female student. The video footage showed the student shooting a firearm and a caption stating "me prepping for school tomorrow" over the video.

Wrigley Drive, Riviera Beach, for a report of a suspect who grabbed a victim's backpack and took off running. Officers met with the victim, who provided a photo of the suspect taken on a cellular phone. The suspect, a 20 year old male, Spring Grove, Illinois was located a short time later by foot patrol officers and placed under arrest. The suspect was transported to the Walworth County Jail and charges for theft were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office.

August—

- Officers were dispatched to a new construction site adjacent to 610 Harmony Drive for a report of a construction worker that fell 30 feet from a crane. Upon arrival, officers

Officers took the 12 year old female student into custody. The student lied to officers initially and stated someone else took the video and made the caption. After further questioning, the student admitted that she posted the video and made the caption. The student was released to her parents and has been referred to Juvenile Intake for disorderly conduct.

- An officer conducted a traffic stop in the 200 block of Cook Street. The officer made contact with the driver, a 29 year old female from Clinton. The officer smelled a strong odor of marijuana emitting from the vehicle. The driver was subsequently placed under arrest. A search incident to arrest revealed a small amount of marijuana, cocaine and drug paraphernalia. Charges for possession of cocaine, possession of THC and possession of drug paraphernalia were referred to the Walworth County DA's Office.

observed that the victim, a 30 year old man, Cherry Valley, Illinois, fell approximately 15 feet from a concrete cross beam when the concrete gave way underneath him. The victim suffered serious injuries and was flown from the scene by Flight for Life. Officers prepared reports and the information was turned over to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

- Officers obtained photos of a male suspect who appeared to wear a disguise to steal some credit cards at the YMCA. Officers shared the suspect's photo on the Wisconsin Crime Alert network. The photo was shared with approximately 20 departments from across Wisconsin and Illinois. This suspect was identified as the person who had committed

October—

- Detectives executed a search warrant at the 1100 block of Pleasant Street. The search warrant was issued as a result of an investigation conducted by the Lake Geneva Police Dept and Carroll County Sheriff's Office in the State of Maryland. The results of the investigation revealed that a 35 year old male was a registered sex offender and made multiple attempts to solicit three juveniles in the State of Maryland. The male subject was placed under arrest and booked in the Walworth County Jail. He was charged with solicitation of child pornography (3 counts), possession of child pornography (10 counts) and violation of sex offender registry.
- Officers responded to the 300 block of Peller Road for a reported kidnapping. The complainant walked into the business at that location and told the clerk to call the police as he

had been kidnapped at gunpoint. Upon arrival, officers located the caller, who was a passenger in a vehicle exiting the parking lot. After a brief investigation, officers determined that the caller, a 26 year old man and the female driver of the vehicle, a 26 year old woman, admitted to smoking methamphetamine before the call and the kidnapping did not occur. The male was arrested and charges of possession of cocaine and possession of methamphetamine were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office. The female was arrested and a charge for operating a motor vehicle under the influence with a minor passenger in the vehicle (2 year old) was referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office. Both were booked into the Walworth County Jail.

of Broad Street for a large fight. Upon arrival, officers broke up the fight and arrested five female suspects. All five suspects, (age range 23-39) were transported to LGPD, booked and cited for disorderly conduct-involved in a fight. Multiple suspects received minor injuries from hair pulling, biting and punching during the altercation. All of the suspects were released after they were cited.

- Officers responded to the 100 block of Main Street for a report of a two year old that fell on a four month old. The four month old was transported to Lakeland Medical Center and later to Children's Hospital. Detectives conducted an investigation and it was determined the injuries to the four month old were consistent with child abuse. In addition, detectives gathered evidence and reasonably believed a 33 year old Lake Geneva man caused the injuries to the

November—

- An officer on routine patrol observed a vehicle traveling the wrong way on Baker Street. The officer conducted a traffic stop and observed the driver of the vehicle continue driving over a sidewalk then onto a grassy area, where it came to a stop. The officer made contact with the driver, a 30 year old Williams Bay man, who appeared under the influence of narcotics. The driver was subsequently arrested for operating a motor vehicle under the influence of a controlled substance. In addition, a passenger in the vehicle appeared to be suffering from a medical condition that officers believed to be drug induced. The passenger, a 21 year old Lake Geneva man, was transported by EMS to Lakeland Medical Center for treatment. The

four month old. The 33 year old male was booked into the Walworth County Jail. Charges for child abuse, obstructing an officer and bail jumping were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office.

- While on routine patrol in the Wal-Mart parking lot, a sergeant observed a 40 year old male placing items into a vehicle. When the male observed the sergeant, he fled the parking lot in a vehicle, leaving numerous items in a cart that rolled away. The sergeant believed a theft had occurred and pursued the male who fled in a vehicle at an accelerated speed with no headlights on. Officers pursued the male, who operated recklessly and disregarded traffic lights and officer's signals to stop. An officer successfully conducted a pursuit intervention technique (PIT) on the fleeing vehicle. The male

driver was cited and released to a responsible party.

- The School Resource Officer at Badger High School took a report of a threat inscribed on a men's bathroom stall door. This threat prompted school administration to dismiss classes early and release students from Badger High School and Lake Geneva Middle School. A detective interviewed a 15 year old student, who admitted to inscribing the threat. The student also admitted his intent was to cause the early dismissal of school. The student was taken into custody, booked and released to his parents. The matter of a terrorist threat was referred to juvenile intake for review.

December—

- Officers responded to the 100 block stopped and surrendered to officers on scene. The male and a female passenger were taken into custody and transported to the Walworth County Jail and charged felony retail theft, reckless driving and knowingly flee an officer.
- Officers responded to the 100 block of Broad Street for a fight. Upon arrival, an officer was reading an identification card of one of the suspects involved. At this time, the suspect attempted to grab the I.D. card from the officer's hand and take off running. The officer immediately gained physical control of the suspect, who was placed under arrest. The suspect, a 22 year old Elkhorn man, was booked into the Walworth County Jail. Charges for disorderly conduct and resisting/obstructing an officer were referred to the Walworth County District Attorney's Office.



All telecommunicators received Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) training and are certified by the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials (APCO). The telecommunicator offers a caller pre-arrival instructions to help them remain calm and assist in lifesaving measures.




The LGPD's Facebook page has more than 9,000 likes. We received almost 2,500 likes in 2018.
